I've encountered a few impossible feeling tasks, but none so daunting as this one: "Can you write a 'short tribute piece' to Farewell Stuart Warren as caterer?"

It's difficult to describe someone thoughtfully without it sounding like an obituary. Just as well, because he will be thoroughly embarrassed to death by everything I'm about to write. He is comfortable bearing a thousand forms of burden – more gracefully than many of us – but praise is not one of them.

An intro for the less familiar: Stu and 1st North Sydney Scouts first began catering at the 2021 Paddy Pallin rogaine. This would have been the first rogaine after Australia's initial lockdowns to feature catering, after some internal soul-searching over whether to begin offering food again at all (many traditional things like mass starts and post-event socialising hadn't been permitted). John Havranek was coordinating/setting, and I was a late addition to that team. Stu was merely an acquaintance, a Generally Competent Person who was scout adjacent.

I don't have any good photos from that event—check the website yourself if you don't believe me! I think most of us are keenly aware that we had to endure our second wave of lockdowns a week later. Despite this, the scouts' food and services, plus the participation of their youth members, were a notable treat. They've been a warm welcome back to Hash House at many events since, and even some brekkies the next day too.
